The infographic, which is available on the AFMLTA <u>website</u>, demonstrates how students with a language background other than English (LBOTE) outperform their peers in all measures and across all levels on NAPLAN tests. In NAPLAN, Language Background Other than English (LBOTE) students outperform their peers in every measure across every year level

# Why this matters for all learners

Research clearly points to the learning and active use of two or more languages providing literacy benefits for all

Learning on additional language has the potential to improve the literacy and numeracy outcomes for all students.

Better literacy and numerocy outcomes in the early years provides a strong foundation for all learning in later years.

In NAPLAN 25 points is roughly one year of progress, indicating LBOTE students may be as much as 2 years ahead of their news.


Learning additional languages (as well as English) also has benefits for LBOTE students.

It is critical to also support all students in the learning of English, appropriate to their needs, as learners of English as a first or additional language or dielect.

## Representation

AFMLTA's recent representation at member events allowed the Executive to draw together some consistent themes from speakers and delegates about Languages education in Australian schools and tertiary institutions. This will inform our advocacy efforts as we move into a new year. There is a need to continue to advocate for reimagining a future for languages education in Australia:

- AFMLTA's material on Towards a National Languages Plan and Strategy offered insight into the context of languages learning in Australia and a vision of what it could be.
- The material that draws from the NAPLAN data and is presented on the AFMLTA website as <u>Why Learning Languages Matter</u> was of great interest.

For the AFMLTA, it was heartening to hear the affirmation from educators who support the outcomes of the AFMLTA work, saying that the research undertaken for the Australian Government is illuminating. Teachers welcomed the vision of a national languages plan.
